

We have a vibrant and supportive research community here at the University of Limerick, with students and faculty leading research into areas as diverse as hate crime legislation, arts and health, early modern European history, dance as an expression of identity, fan culture and popular music, the writings of W.B. Yeats, and language acquisition and teaching. These areas reflect just some of the diverse research strengths and areas of expertise with the Faculty. We have a number of research groups, centres and clusters that reflect particular areas of research excellence and impact within the Faculty, and which regularly organise events, lectures and seminars.

A supportive and ambitious research culture

Postgraduate researchers within the Faculty of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences have access to research supports, resources and infrastructure. These are an essential part of your PhD. Students who are undertaking an MA or PhD by research will be allocated a study space within the PG research area with their own computer and printing facilities. Irish World Academy students are located in the Academy building.

Research students can apply for annual research funding to support their activities such as conference attendance and fieldwork. Fee awards and scholarships for our programmes are advertised annually in March on the AHSS Research webpage, and a range of scholarship options are also advertised on the Irish World Academy of Music and Dance website.

The Faculty regularly organises training events to support postgraduates to develop their professional skills. These include our PhD Life Hacks event, funding clinics, research brown-bag seminars and the Annual Inbhear event which focuses on supporting researchers in the publication and dissemination of their research across a range of disciplines and practices.

Researchers are also supported by a range of resources such as the Annual AHSS Conference, IT skills and writing retreats available through the Regional Writing Centre. Please see below an outline of events for the coming academic year.

AHSS funded research projects

Research students within the Faculty of Arts, Humanities & Social Sciences can apply annually to the AHSS Postgraduate Research Committee for research funding to support their activities such as conference attendance and fieldwork. Awardees have written about how these funds assisted their research and below are extracts from their reports;

Beth Duane is a PhD candidate in the School Law. She received funding to attend a conference in Leeds. The conference was the Socio-Legal Studies Association (SLSA) Annual Conference at the School of Law, University of Leeds.

‘In April 2019, I presented my paper entitled, ‘Prison Violence in Ireland: A Multi-Dimensional Analysis’. ... My paper discussed the phenomenon of prison violence with a view to establishing that a violent event is part of a process with multiple factors and effects, which causes physical and emotional harm for both prisoners and operational staff in Ireland. ... One of the highlights of the conference was sharing this experience with a number of people from the School of Law. ... A huge thank you to AHSS for partly funding this experience, as I would not have been able to attend this event without this financial assistance’.

Tracy McAvinue is a PhD candidate in the School of English, Irish and Communication. She received funding from the Faculty of AHSS to attend a conference, read extracts from her report below on the benefits of attending a big conference.

‘On 22-26 July I attended the 2019 annual conference for the International Association for the Study of Irish Literatures (IASIL) in Trinity College Dublin, for which I gratefully received funding from the AHSS. ... The annual IASIL conference is one of the biggest in Irish studies, with members located in 35 countries worldwide. This conference was markedly different to anything else that I had attended. My experience of conferences thus far has been limited to ones of a much smaller scale. ... There are numerous advantages to participating in a conference of this size. The conference was populated by the key academic figures in mine and related fields, and internationally-acclaimed scholars and writers delivered papers or were plenary speakers. Due to the numerous contributors, I was able to hear about a range of topics, and particularly see how senior academics deliver papers, and the nuanced approaches they take. The main benefits, however, are the immense networking possibilities; this has led to a number of opportunities for me going forward including potential collaborations and further conferences related to my research area. Presenting my work and networking at this conference has helped to establish me and my research area at a vital point in my academic career, and I returned home armed with ideas and recommendations that will be of tremendous benefit. ... In all, attending big conferences such as this can be extremely beneficial to early career scholars, but could be quite intimidating to a new or inexperienced graduate student. This is why, of course, the opportunity offered by AHSS to attend conferences in the first year of a PhD without presenting is so valuable and certainly one to be availed of’.

TESOL PhD candidate György Nagy attended the MATSDA/University of Liverpool 2019 Conference in Liverpool in June with the funding support from AHSS.

‘... At the conference, György presented his chapter entitled “Towards Intercultural Competence: a Model-Based Framework for Improving English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) Learners’ Cultural Content Knowledge” from the forthcoming volume *ESOL Provision in the UK and Ireland: Challenges and Opportunities* (Oxford: Peter Lang) edited by Freda Mishan. He discussed his PhD research which focuses on the extent to which English language learning materials develop learners’ intercultural competence in an Irish context with a number of prominent academics from a variety

of backgrounds. ... The conference was an ideal platform for bridging the gap between research, practice and dissemination. György wishes to thank AHSS for providing funding for his conference presentation and his supervisors Dr Freda Mishan and Dr Marta Giralto for their invaluable and continuous support in his PhD research studies at the School of Modern Languages and Applied Linguistics’.

Peter Stapleton, a postgraduate researcher with Department of History received funding to undertake a four-day research trip to the Cardinal O Fiaich Memorial Library in Armagh. Below are extracts from his report on his fieldtrip:

‘The aim on this trip was to examine the papers of Cardinal O Fiaich, Fr. Denis Faul and Fr. Raymond Murray. My research is focussed on the involvement of the Catholic Church clergy and hierarchy in several key issues that arose during the conflict in Northern Ireland, between 1968 and 1985. These issues include internment and the treatment of internees, the prison protests and hunger strikes, correspondence between Catholic clergy and British and Northern Irish governments and the involvement of Irish-American Catholic groups and clergy. ... The Cardinal O Fiaich Memorial library also holds the papers of Fr. Faul and Fr. Murray who were heavily involved in reporting the treatment of internees and the treatment of Catholics under internment and campaigned on the behalf of the protesting prisoners who were pushing for political status in the H-Blocks. Alongside these collections, the library holds a limited amount of material from the Cardinal William Conway papers regarding internment which provided a notable amount of material relevant to my research. ...’

Ellen Reid is a PhD candidate with the Department of Sociology, concentrating on LGBT+ identity. She recently attended the Identity in Times of Change Conference at the University of Manchester to present her paper ‘Truly a nation of equals?: Trans exclusion in Irish LGBT+ social movements from 1983 to 2015’:

‘ ... While my PhD will more broadly investigate LGBT+ identity in the context of Ireland’s marriage equality referendum, my conference paper focused on the absence of influence of TERF ideology in Ireland. ... I expected to be questioned on the arguments I was making, particularly in light of the recent developments in Irish feminist and LGBT+ groups – namely the decision made by Dublin Pride to have RTE as an official sponsor of the annual pride march after the airing of a transphobic episode of Prime Time. However, many people approached me following my panel to ask further questions, share their concerns about TERFism in the UK, and I was able to network and make links with researchers in Manchester and further afield. ... I was delighted to see such a wide-range of papers on LGBT+/queer identities, warranting two panels dedicated to this theme. Some of the highlights of this conference for me was learning about the diversity of work on queer identity being done in the UK and further afield – from lesbian visibility in Manchester, to Grindr Tourism, and queer identity construction through zine creation. I would like to extend my gratitude to the AHSS for giving me the funding to be able to travel to attend this conference.
