20 YEARS Centre for Irish-German Studies!

It also celebrated the centenary of Heinrich Böll's birth. It was a wonderful event with excellent speakers (including Heinrich Böll's son René) who gave evidence of the breadth and depth of Irish-German Studies. The following pages will give you a taste of the event.

We are also happy to introduce a number of new members and our first visiting research fellow – and highlight the events of spring 2018.

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17th International Limerick Conference in Irish-German Studies – 20th Anniversary Conference of the Centre for Irish-German Studies & Commemoration of Heinrich Böll's 100th Birthday – Irish-German Relations 2017: Between Böll and Brexit, DAAD Alumni conference, Analog Devices Building, University of Limerick, 14 September – 16 September 2017.

The 3-day conference celebrated two anniversaries: the 20-years' existence of the Centre for Irish-German Studies and the Nobel laureate Heinrich Böll, who would have turned 100 this year. The conference emphasised how Irish-German relations have changed over the last 20 years with a special focus on the event which is likely to impact on Irish-German relations in a major way, the impending departure of the United Kingdom from the European Union, or Brexit. Over 50 contributors from all areas of Irish-German relations including academics (science and humanities), diplomats, journalists, artists, poets and musicians covered a multitude of aspects, such as Heinrich Böll and Ireland, connections in science, artistic interfaces, Irish Studies in German-speaking countries, media discourses and Irish-German migration as well as historical and literary links. Speakers and other attendees (altogether over 150, including students and additional guests who attended the concert and readings) came from Ireland, Great Britain, Germany, Austria, Italy and Switzerland.

In keeping with the tradition of our Irish-German conferences, the programme contained not only academic presentations and discussions but also cultural events. On Thursday evening, a concert took place at the Irish World Academy of Music and Dance, a rare public (and free) performance of the Irish Sonata, written by the Austrian refugee composer Kurt Roger (1895-1966). Joachim Roewer, principal viola of the Irish Chamber Orchestra, and Lance Coburn, member of the Royal Irish Academy of Music, performed this wonderful piece of music for conference participants and other guests to great acclaim. The

piece was introduced by Leslie Stevenson, former Reader of Philosophy at St Andrews, who told the love story of Kurt Roger and Leslie's aunt Joy Roger-Hammerschlag which lay behind the *Irish Sonata*. A collection in support of current refugees living in Ireland raised €300 and was gratefully accepted by the Limerick refugee organization Doras Luimní.

On Friday evening the programme included a reading by two writers, Joe Joyce and Eva Bourke. Joe Joyce is a journalist and author of the *Echoland*-trilogy (the Dublin One City One Book Choice 2017), a series of spy novels set in Dublin during World War II. Eva Bourke is an Irish poet and translator and a member of Aosdána. Born in Germany, she has lived for much of her life in Galway. The reading was followed by a presentation of recent publications in Irish-German Studies (see below) and a BBQ – musically accompanied by a UL-based Ceilí band which tempted at least some of the conference participants to try out Irish dancing.

The conference concluded on Saturday, with lively discussions up to the very end. It was supported by the DAAD; the Heinrich Böll Stiftung; the Austrian and German Embassies; the Goethe Institut Irland; the Centre for European Studies (CEUROS), the Schools of Modern Languages and Applied Linguistics and Culture and Communication, the Faculty of AHSS and the IACF, University of Limerick.

New Members of the Centre

Dr Maria Rieder

Maria Rieder is currently a Post-Doctoral Researcher in the area of sociolinguistics at the University of Limerick where she works in different projects that critically study the role of language in situations of economic and social inequality.

Her main current project is a major interdisciplinary and international study of the news coverage of Thomas Piketty's book *Capital in the 21st Century* using Critical Discourse Analysis, Framing and Content Analysis. Further, she is involved in projects on media and social protest, issues of immigration and asylum, critical intercultural communication and minority

languages and economics. Prior to her research position, she undertook a folk-linguistic and ethnographic study of the Irish Traveller Cant. Her research interests lie in the fields of social and economic inequality, human rights and minority communities, with a specific focus on the role of language, language perceptions and language ideologies in the production of power and social conflict. She also teaches modules in Sociolinguistics and Applied Linguistics, such as Language and Cultural Theory, Introduction to Applied Linguistics and Research Methods, with a focus on Critical Discourse Analysis, Pragmatics and Gender and Race Studies.

Fabian Ram, DAAD-Lektor



studied Fabian Ram German Intercultural Philology, Communication and Business Management at the University of Regensburg in Germany Wheaton College, MA in the United States. Since September 2017 he is DAAD Lektor in German at the School of Modern Languages and Applied Linguistics, UL. Prior to that he was working for the Goethe

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Institute in Cape Town, South Africa and the Centre of Languages and Communication at the University of Regensburg. He teaches various modules on German literature, culture and history as well as German for business. In addition he represents the German Academic Exchange Service, promotes studying or doing research in Germany, and also informs about funding opportunities.

Natascha Guggi, Austrian Lektor



September 2017 Natascha In Guggi joined the School Modern Languages and Applied as OeAD-lecturer. Linguistics She studied German language and literature at the University of Graz in Austria and at the University of Modena, in Italy. Natascha began her career as a language assistant with the OeAD in Verona, Italy. She then went to work for Caritas Austria, teaching German

refugees, while working on an additional degree in GFL and GSL. As a new member of the Centre for Irish-German Studies she is particularly interested in the relationship between Austria and Ireland, which has deep historical roots. Natascha brings in an Austrian point of view and is happy to organise cultural events that foster Irish-Austrian relations. She is currently organising a reading by the young Austrian author Anna Weidenholzer at UL in March 2018.

Dr Deirdre Byrnes, external member at NUI Galway



Dr Deirdre Byrnes is Senior Lecturer in German at the National University of Ireland, Galway. Her research interests include memory, language and identity contemporary German-language in Deirdre's literature. recent work concerned with memorialisation museology; she has published an article on trauma, memory practices and the recovery of marginalised voices at the Berlin-Hohenschönhausen memorial site. She has a particular interest in GDR literature and is the author of the monograph Rereading Monika Maron:

Text, Counter-Text and Context. Together with Dr Gisela Holfter and Dr Jean Conacher, she is currently co-editing the volume Exploring Connections between Ireland and the GDR.

Raphael Schmitt started his three months internship on the 1st September. He studied history and cultural studies for his BA (2016) and is currently studying for his MA in *Kulturwissenschaften* (Cultural Studies) at the University of Vechta, Germany.

Dr Deirdre Mulrooney – first Visiting Research Fellow of the Centre



Since her Phd, Orientalism, Orientation, and the Nomadic Work of Pina Bausch (Frankfurt: Peter Lang, 2002), was launched at Dublin's Goethe Institute, Deirdre has been restoring the body, and work by Irish women artists of the body to Irish Cultural History. In May 2004 coinciding with the 2nd International Dance Festival Ireland, "Nice Moves", Deirdre's 5-part documentary series on the history of

dance and physical theatre in Ireland was broadcast on RTE Radio One. Deirdre's book Irish Moves, an illustrated history of Dance & Physical Theatre in Ireland (Dublin: The Liffey Press, 2006), was launched by Fintan O'Toole at the Abbey Theatre as part of the 3rd International Dance Festival Ireland. In 2011 Deirdre's feature radio documentary on the Abbey Theatre Ballets, "Doreen - Telling the Dancer from the Dance" was broadcast on RTE Lyric FM. Deirdre has made two film documentaries on Irish-German Modern Dance pioneer Erina Brady: "1943 – A Dance Odyssey" (RTE One Television, 2013), and her TG4 Splanc! documentary "Dance Emergency/ Damhsa na hEigeandala" (TG4, 2015), which have been selected for several Film festivals, from Galway Film Fleadh to the Lincoln Center NYC's Dance on Camera Festival. In May 2015 Deirdre's script for "Dance Emergency" was published bilingually in TANZ Magazine (Berlin), and an abbreviated version appeared on the

Goethe Institute Ireland website. Her biographical essay on Erina Brady was published in "Selected Irish-German Biographies 2" (Trier: WVT, 2015) edited by Sabine Egger, and she co-organised the "Irish-German Connections in Motion" conference at UL in 2016. Deirdre's research at Cologne Dance Centre comprises substantiating the German traces of Erina Brady's training and performance history, before her 1939 arrival to Dublin. As part of her research fellowship she will give a public lecture in spring 2018.

Readings and presentations by Sophia Kingshill



Acclaimed author and editor Sophia Kingshill has visited the Centre from 2nd October - 4th October and met with students of the MA in Comparative Literature and Cultural Studies and the MA in Creative Writing well with as as students of the IWAMD. Sophia Kingshill is the author of a range of acclaimed books from children's books (Between the Raven and the Dove, Accent Press 2017) folklore to (Mermaids, Little Toller Books

2015 and, with Jennifer Westwood, *The Fabled Coast*, Random House 2012). She also helped editing her father Peter Kingshill's memoirs *Footnote*. Peter's parents came to Ireland in the late 1930s as refugees from Germany.

Talking with Bernhard Schlink

Embedded in the programme of the seminar 'German 20th century literature', taught by Gisela Holfter, was the reading of German author Bernhard Schlink's famous novel *Der Vorleser* (1995). The students hardly expected discussing the book individually with the author himself, by means of a skype conversation. The students prepared questions about the book for this very special session, which were answered in a friendly and patient manner by Bernhard Schlink.

Connect Mentoring Training in UL in October 2017



group of A participants from several countries (Germany. Finland, Poland, Spain and Portugal – as well as Ireland, of course) were hosted by the Centre for Irish-German Studies for five days. Starting on 25th October 2017, this Mentor training was part of the **'CONNECT**

Intercultural Learning Network for Europe' project, a three-year cross-sectoral project bringing together practitioners and experts from the university and youth sector. It is funded by the European Union under ERASMUS+. Integrating methods and concepts from non-formal youth education to formal education, the project was initiated to create an innovative intercultural learning scenario consisting of an e-learning platform and curricula for pre-departure and re-entry orientation to support Erasmus+ participants (students, interns, and volunteers) before, during and after their exchange. Film Series on 1968 student revolution

The Centre will co-operate with the Ralahine Centre for Utopian Studies in a film series marking the 50th anniversary of the student rebellion in 1968 entitled *Realising Utopia: Cinema & 1968*. The series will include films from several countries and is scheduled to run at Ormston House Limerick between March and May 2018. Dr Joachim Fischer will introduce Hans Weingartner's film *Die fetten Jahre sind vorbei / The Edukators* (2004) on 11 April 2018, the anniversary of the assassination attempt on Rudi Dutschke. Dr Fischer is also one of the organisers of the Ralahine workshop scheduled for 26 May 2018 which will conclude the film series and will also feature a session on Germany.

New Double Degree MA in European Studies with Irish-German elements

A delegation from the Europa Universität Flensburg (EUF) visited the University of Limerick on 23/24 October. The high-ranking delegation which included both the EUF President and Vice President for International and European Affairs came to explore closer co-operation with UL in the area of European Studies and others fields. During their visit they met with members of the Centre. German-Irish elements will feature in the Double Degree MA in European Studies currently being planned by both universities which is due to start in 2019.

Dr Gisela Holfter was appointed Visiting Scholar at the Centre for British Studies, Humboldt Universität Berlin, for the academic year 2018/2019.


